

Dear Edwards Church Community,

The approach of Thanksgiving gets my taste buds tingling with anticipation. Right now, just thinking about it, can't you picture – even smell – your favorite dishes? There are favorites that divide families (apple vs. pumpkin vs. pecan for pies) and there are favorites that unite families. In my extended family of in-laws, the unifying force on the holiday groaning board is squash rolls.

Thanksgiving, Christmas, even Easter – no family meal on a major holiday is fully celebrated if it does not include squash rolls. The recipe originates in Fanny Farmer's *Boston Cooking-School Cookbook*, which was given to my wife's maternal grandmother, known as Frannie. She received the book as a wedding present from a good friend in the 1920's because, as even she would say, she was a "slapdash cook" in need of help. Over the years, she became renown for a few simple but satisfying dishes, especially her squash rolls.

When I had my first squash roll, I was initially underwhelmed. After all the build up, I was anticipating something more spectacular, something flashy. This was a simple but satisfying dinner roll, with a subtle undertone of butternut squash. Light for the first few bites, the rolls are surprisingly filling. Frannie combined ultrafine and regular flour, then blended in jars of pureed squash baby food for her dough. Just the right combination of conveniences, while mostly following the cookbook recipe.

In recent years, especially since Frannie died and her great-grandchildren have become young adults, it has been a joy to see and hear their anticipation over the latest batch of squash rolls baking for our special meals. In the 1990's, they would stand on a rickety stool in her kitchen, leaning over the counter to cut out dough with an inverted juice glass, brush on some melted butter and fold them into the baking pan. Since her death, the recipe has been passed around. Uncle Steve has become the undisputed master squash roll baker of our generation and is sharing the recipe with all who ask.

This is how we hand over, take on and adapt traditions. If offered a form of sustenance and shown how to share it, every generation will acquire a taste for something good that feeds us. They will appreciate it and make it their own. Recipes are passed down and adapted. (We now use freshly mashed squash, but still blend ultrafine and regular flour.) This happens in our worship, church school, adult faith formation, outreach and every other ministry of the church. While we practice the faith, we are already handing it on and inviting those who will follow to make it their own.

- Edwards Church has a Circle of Care group committed to accompanying a refugee family as they settle in Northampton. Members of the group have been vetted through Catholic Charities and have committed to at least a 6 month time frame once a family is matched with us. Another round of trainings will take place after the holidays. If you are interested in learning more about what being part of a Circle of Care entails, (and there will be ample opportunity as we accompany a family for 5 years) please be in contact with me.

Longing to find the holy in ourselves and others, we listen for God's still-speaking voice:

An Appeal for Legos

Do you have any Legos you no longer use? Deb Moore would be happy to add them to the collection the Middler class has been using to replicate Bible stories. While we especially need Lego people, all Legos will be graciously received.



The MANNA Soup Kitchen desperately needs turkeys this year for its Thanksgiving Day community dinner at which about 400 meals will be served in our Addis Hall and from which about 200 meals will be delivered to the homes of people who cannot get to our church. Our usual main source of turkeys, The Food Bank of Western Mass, has informed us that they may not have any turkeys this year to distribute to the agencies they serve. The reason may be the lingering effect of the bird disease that struck turkey flocks a couple of years ago. This year we are serving only turkey at the Thanksgiving meal instead of turkey and ham - we will have ham at the Christmas dinner. We will need about 40 turkeys of average weight about 15 pounds. This year the turkeys will be cooked and carved at UMass in a day and a half, and the carved meat will be delivered to Edwards Church on Thanksgiving morning. We used to have to cook and carve them at St. John's Episcopal Church and Edwards Church over a three-day period.

Outreach With Our Building

One of the ways we connect with and serve the local community is by accommodating a number of groups that need an affordable place to gather. These groups are as diverse as: the Northampton Parents Center; MANNA community meals; support groups like AA, the Augustine Fellowship and the Valley Men's Support Group; and the River Valley Sangha (a Buddhist meditation and learning group). Starting soon, our outreach will include providing space to two new groups: a Girl Scout Brownie troop and the Hampshire County District Attorney's Recovery Support Center.

The Recovery Support Center will operate three afternoon's per week, from 1-5 p.m. in the ground floor meeting rooms, offering recovery support to individuals in recovery from opioid addiction. Like many other facets of our outreach, we were asked to help and are pleased to be able to do so. 
Mindfulness in Relationship

October 12, 2016

Meeting opened at 7:00 with a music prayer from David Kidwell. Correction to September Minutes – add Heather Dandy under staff. Minutes of September Council meeting unanimously approved.

Joys and Concerns of Staff and Committees:

- Joy: Tom Derr was able to step in on short notice and it went well.
- Joy: 12 people talking about White Privilege.
- Joy: Alan & Heather celebrated their 17th anniversary with a trip to NY.
- Joy: The 1st quote for repairing the front steps has been received.

Questions on committee reports:

- Trustees electrical for coffee pot. Marney Electric has the part (new breakter) on order for the panel.
- Financial so far having a good year, mostly because of endowment monies being up. We may have a small surplus, but pledges are slightly behind.
- Social Investment no update. Next meeting Monday, October 17, 2016.
- Music Committee has not had a meeting this month.

Vision Implementation – working on next steps.

Community Based Socially Responsible Investment

Next Meeting Monday, October 17, 2016.

<u>Christmas Schedule</u> – will go in Spire and may be put into bulletin.

Open & Affirming Statement – Want to be sure the church community is involved. If it makes us nervous we should talk about it. Talking about it can be awkward regardless of gender identity. More challenging than words on a paper or putting up signs. We should talk more, put proposed language out there and have multiple meetings and discussion. How people feel matters. Comment made to do it right, even if it takes longer before we vote. Don't want to push it through. Could have a special meeting in March for some of these important things.

Bathroom Signage and Gender Identity – will have to go through the same process as the Open & Affirming Statement. Would appreciate extra time to have it be done well.

<u>Worship Feedback Sessions</u> – Group understood what they were asked to do. Questions were helpful. It is easier to have specific questions to respond back to. It is very helpful to have some ground rules to keep things focused. Question asked if it would work if it was done with the congregations and the response was positive. Suggestion made to have a regular cycle so people would get more comfortable with it. Plan for the next one is to get a mixture of age ranges and points of view. Flow of meeting was good. No one felt rushed, but at the end of the meeting felt it was too short as people had more to say. 90 minutes seemed better than a one hour meeting.

New Business:

- Circles of Care 6-8 individuals or families to help acclimate refugees to Northampton. Three training sessions coming up. Catholic Charities in conversation with mayor and schools and social services. Still need housing. This is an interfaith city-wide effort.
- Nominating Committee: Carl Erickson and Maryann Bankman to co-chair. Vice Moderator, Clerk, and Collector are key positions to fill.
- Memorial Committee: Question on one council at large is to head memorial committee. There are supposed to be three members: 1 Council at large; 1 Deacon; 1 Trustee. Suggestion was made to have memorial committee look at memorial book.

The next Council meeting will be held on November 9 at 7 p.m.

Meeting adjourned at 7:55 with a closing prayer from Deb.
