Dear Edwards Church Community,

On October 25th, I attended the 1st anniversary party of the Northampton Recovery Center in the Edwards Room. For the last year, individuals currently in recovery from any form of addiction (mostly opioids or alcohol), with allies from the DA's office and other volunteers, have used our church for organizational meetings and recovery support gatherings. They have used the sanctuary for yoga, meditation and other practices that supplement and support familiar routes of recovery. It is one of many activities through which we live into our vision: "we call on all our talents to worship and serve. Encountering the world's joys and suffering, we offer ourselves as instruments of love and justice."

At the Recovery Center anniversary party, participants in its program shared testimony about the difference it makes in their lives and presented me with an engraved wooden plaque, made in the workshop at the Hampshire County jail by program participants. If you had been there, you would have been as moved as I was by their testimonies and gratitude. They can feel that the community is supporting their recovery, and that alone helps. On your behalf, I thanked them by saying, "As a church, we are in the transformation business, but you are doing the hard work of walking the talk of transformation. That makes a huge difference." As someone said at a recent gathering of the United Way, "It takes the whole valley to tackle our biggest challenges."

Thank you for giving me and each other the opportunity and the resources to do this work together. Stewardship raises the money, and you contribute. Trustees help maintain the building: we all use it and share it with our neighbors. Deacons, Faith Formation and Music make Sunday morning special, reconnecting us with the spiritual center of our lives and inspiring us to do so much together, for the church and the world.

The traditional American story of Thanksgiving has Native Americans coming to the aid of the Pilgrims during their first winter and saving them from starvation. Our history after that is still being rewritten to take into account how the Europeans prospered and at what cost to whom. I often think, as a person of white European ancestry, that there was a significant hidden cost to "us." My people (more or less) emerged "on top," but are now needing to relearn some ancient wisdom, wisdom that is both crosscultural and essentially Christian, wisdom like the interdependence of all life and the importance of active compassion for the weak, the poor and all "others."

I do not suggest that those who are secure or successful, in conventional terms, need to feel guilty. But as we approach the season of Thanksgiving, I hope all will remember the source of our lives and good fortune. It is not just individual talent or hard work, which are necessary, but not sufficient. It also requires luck and a family, maybe a whole community of support, sharing its gifts, offering support, creating the conditions for our prospering. To whom do we owe the same? Who is our neighbor?



Reaching Out to Girls Inc.

Encountering the world's joys and suffering, we offer ourselves as instruments of love and justice.

One of the joys of serving on the Edwards Church Committee on Christian Outreach is the ability to designate financial grants to community organizations which serve the hungry and the homeless (among others), and those which provide special services to children and young people. Most of the committee's budget is used to provide annual grants, ranging from \$320 to \$3000, to 19 such organizations. Some, such as Manna and Cathedral in the Night, have strong ties to Edwards. All of our contributions serve to help our neighbors and connect us to the wider community.

This is the first of a series of articles designed to reacquaint us with the groups which receive ongoing support from Edwards via the Outreach Committee.

This year we added Girls Inc. of Holyoke to the list of recipients, with an annual grant of \$1000. We had given them a one-time donation in the past. A few Outreach members got to know the group's work through various channels, including the yearly fundraising breakfast, and from their reports we learned about the transformative influence Girls Inc. has in the lives of girls and young women who would otherwise be at risk.

The organization is affiliated with the national group Girls Incorporated (formerly Girls Club of America). It serves girls aged 5 – 18 in Holyoke and nearby communities, with the goal of "inspiring girls to be strong, smart and bold." Programs are offered year round, mostly free of charge, emphasizing academic tutoring (especially in science and technology) but also focusing on life skills such as money management, good health habits, and the development of leadership qualities. Girls who have participated in Girls Inc. programs are more likely to graduate from high school, to attend college, to achieve economic independence, and to have higher self-esteem, and less likely to become pregnant or to engage in violence.

Suzanne Parker, the Executive Director of Girls. Inc., will join us for worship on November 5 and will be available during fellowship time to share her experience and insights. Please welcome her!

Update on our Refugee Family and How You Can Help

Every month brings new accomplishments and new challenges for our refugee family. Ayoob is now a licensed driver after hours of instruction and will soon take possession of a 2004 Toyota Corolla donated by a Northampton family. He is fully employed and recently received a pay raise based on his excellent work ethic. Several nights each week, Ayoob continues his English instruction and has started working towards his GED. Yousuf is a full time student at Holyoke Community College in the English as a Second Language program and dedicates much of his spare time to caring for his mother. His summer job ended in October, and he is looking for part time work, perhaps two days a week. If you know about work possibilities, please contact Deb Moore.

Jasimiyah begins physical therapy this month and has qualified for Social Security Disability Benefits which helps the family's finances. The members of their Circle of Care from Edwards Church continue to love working with this family—celebrating their victories, sharing events in our area (here is Jasimiyah enjoying the Bridge of Flowers) and helping to support them as they face new challenges. Although, they are living in a wonderful apartment at Village Hill, thanks to a local builder, this unit will only be



available until next March. We know that affordable, accessible housing will be a challenge, and we would like to ask every member of our church to be on a look out for an affordable three bedroom unit that is either handicap accessible or could be made accessible by adding ramps and grab bars.

This family has blessed us in so many ways. We love the relationship between Jasimiyah and her sons. We have learned much about spiritual piety when we are with them and the call to prayer sounds on their phones. We admire their determination to build a new life in America but know that they worry about family members in Iraq. We can only imagine the fear that bubbles up when deadly explosions in Iraq make our news. We enjoy sharing food, learning new vocabulary in both English and Arabic, sharing musical performances and community events, ensuring that they get to doctors' appointments, and being a part of a network of love that includes you.

The Campaign to Reclaim Our Future (endorsed by our Outreach Committee)

The Campaign to Reclaim Our Future will highlight the United Nations Climate Talks being held in Bonn, Germany, in November and organize a series of demonstrations calling on political leaders to restore care for creation. There will be a march and candlelight rally in Northampton on Sunday, November 5, the night before the Bonn conference opens, and then two separate standouts at the Springfield office of Governor Charlie Baker from 12:15 to 12:45 pm on Monday, November 6 and Thursday, November 16. We will demand that politicians "Reclaim Our Future" from the dirty air, joblessness and floods and fires of climate change. We will demand that the US rejoin the Paris Agreement and that Charlie Baker "Stand Up" and fulfill his pledge to follow the international climate agreement in Massachusetts, as he promised when Trump pulled our federal government out.
