From the Minister of Faith Formation

Dear Beloved of God,

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven... Ecclesiastes 3:1-8

Ahh...welcome Autumn; one of my three favorite seasons, followed by winter and spring. The colors that we see in New England – varying hues of yellow, orange, red, brown, and purple leaves adorn the trees and when driving in or through mountain areas look like tufted quilts blanketing the hills and mountain sides. As the trees begin to shed their leaves dropping them and depending on the tree, acorns as well, seeds of what will come



make their way into the ground below. As we walk through or over them, the rustling, fallen leaves sing to me. Tree limbs, once covered, become window frames for that which was previously obscured from our view.



Winter, following Autumn, takes into her care and gestating nurture seeds her sister season (and perhaps some of us, gardeners, etc.) entrusted to her. And then along comes Spring with budding leaves, greening grass emerging from the ground, the return of longer days and walks outdoors, open windows, the smell of newly turned earth, the return of nature's alarm clock as chirping birds join chorus in early morning, the emergence of those animals who had hibernated and budding leaves on trees. Crocuses, tulips, daisies, butterflies and so much more!

My name is Susan Swift and I am both a member of Edwards Church and the Director of Development for Friends of Children (an organization that advocates for children and young adults in and aging out of the foster care system). On Sunday, September 24th, the young adults (FOCUS program) of Friends of Children were doubly blessed. Thank you.

Glorious quilts were displayed and then given to us by the quilt committee as part of an ongoing project that we have been so fortunate to be on the receiving end of. These quilts have been gratefully received and treasured by our FOCUS young adults. And Sandra Rossi's poem attached to each of them was just stunning.

It was also announced that the Outreach Committee made a grant of \$2,500 to our FOCUS Financial Fitness Matching Grant series. We are raising \$10,000 to match the savings of FOCUS young adults as they create their own savings through working on our Financial Fitness series. This is two-year three-part program helps our young adults:

- become financially secure,
- practice smart money management and
- become knowledgeable about budgeting, smart saving and investment strategies.

From your Open and Affirming Ministry Team

Why highlight a bathroom? It's an important improvement in our church facilities and a big step forward in living out our covenant to be an open and affirming congregation. We have the Buildings and Grounds Ministry Team to thank for making our new all-gender restroom a reality.



Why does Edwards Church need an all-gender restroom?

Our welcome to LGBTQ+ folks must extend beyond the threshold in tangible, visible, affirming ways. Transgender and gender non-conforming people often experience harassment, refusal of access, and even violence when trying to use public restrooms. Our all-gender restroom is a clear statement that Edwards Church is a safe space where everyone is welcomed, respected and affirmed for who they are.

Members of the wider community have begun to take notice of our new bathroom. When staff from Northampton's new Division of Community Care stopped by to introduce themselves to Michael and Deb recently, a member of the team commented that having a clearly identified all-gender bathroom is great. And, we're getting the word out by listing our restroom on the Refuge Restrooms app, which you can use to locate safe restrooms near your location. https://www.refugerestrooms.org/

How do I know which bathroom I should direct visitors to?

Everyone should be allowed to decide for themselves which bathroom fits their identity. So, tell visitors where <u>all</u> of the restrooms are so they can make an informed choice. "There's an all-gender bathroom at the end of the front hall by the Edwards Room and there are women's and men's restrooms down the other hallway toward the back of the building."

Please don't tell visitors which bathroom you think they should use. Some transgender people desire gender neutral bathroom space; some identify as women and men and should not be pressured or forced out of women's or men's rooms.

Many people will find the all-gender bathroom a welcome option including:
Parents accompanying their child to the bathroom
Those who want to avoid the wait for a gender-specific bathroom that is in use
People meeting in the Edwards Room who don't want to run all the way down the hall!


Thanks to the Building and Grounds Ministry Team and everyone in our congregation for helping us be truly welcoming to everyone!


